DIOCESE OF TORONTO NEW MANDATORY VACCINATION POLICY

In order to best protect our parish community and those we serve against the highly contagious and dangerous nature of the Covid-19 variants, the Diocese of Toronto has implemented a "Covid-19 Mandatory Vaccination Policy".

Effective September 30, 2021, all employees, members of the clergy and **all church volunteers** must show proof of being vaccinated with two doses of an approved Health Canada vaccine, with the second dose having been administered at least two weeks prior to the in-person attendance. The Churchwardens, Eleanor Lorde and Brian Carr, are responsible for verifying proof of vaccination. They are not allowed to delegate this duty to anyone else.

Proof of vaccination is **not required** to attend worship services.

In order to implement the policy, we are asking all volunteers to bring a copy of your Ministry of Health form confirming that you have had two doses of the vaccination to the church. Eleanor Lorde will be at the church on Wednesday September 30 and Thursday October 1 from 9 to 11 and will record the status of any volunteers who can come at that time. Brian will be at the church after the 8:30 service and before 10 o'clock on October 3 for the same purpose.

Brian will retain the records in a safe place offsite to ensure confidentiality.

If you cannot come this week during the Wednesday or Thursday morning hours, you can contact Brian at brianrcarr21@gmail.com or at 416 456 1703 to arrange to show evidence of vaccination. This can be done by Zoom or other similar internet communication so that there is no need for a personal meeting. It is important that you demonstrate that you have received two doses of the vaccination as soon as possible because you will not be able to fulfill any volunteer role after September 29 until you do so.

" My voice, my equal future"

This is the call ringing out around the world as people recognized that nobody is free until everyone is free.

Monday, October 11, is Thanksgiving Day in Canada, where women and girls enjoy the right to go to school, choose a life partner, earn a living in a valued profession and freely make decisions in their lives.

But this same day marks United Nations Day of the Girl Child, when we are asked to hear the voices of the millions of girls worldwide who have no such opportunities. No chance to be educated, no choice of a husband, no money to call their own.

This year, the image of the women and girls of Afghanistan is etched in our minds, as their future narrows under Taliban rule.

We see too the little ones in refugee camps, whose future is clouded with poverty.

We hear the voices of teen-agers crying out for us to do something about climate change, powerless to act but determined to make us notice the plight of the planet they will inherit. We cannot see the girl children sold into slavery or working in the factories from which we buy clothes, made less expensive for us by their labour, but we know they are there. We are called to be the hands, the voice, the heart of Jesus in a hurting world.

Saint Luke - apostle to the gentiles, physician, author

On October 15 we celebrate the Feast of St. Luke, who is the author of the third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostle. His Greek literary style indicates that he was a well-educated man and he was also believed to be a doctor. While he definitely was not an apostle who witnessed personally any works of Christ, he meticulously researched many events surrounding our Lord.

Born in Antioch, the capital of Syria, in 50 AD, Luke, though probably a gentile, was very knowledgeable in all things Jewish, speaking Greek and Aramaic. He travelled with Paul and became his faithful companion until Paul's death (2 Timothy 4; 11)

After the resurrection of Christ, it seems Luke became a very close friend of Mary, and much of his work is drawn from her and her friends. He wrote to proclaim, persuade and interpret the good news of Christ mainly for non-Jews. One quarter of the New Testament was written by Luke (more than any other writer). It is because of him that we are able to know much about the lifetime of Christ. Then after the Ascension, Luke helps us to understand, in the Acts of the Apostles, how Christianity grew from a small movement within Judaism to what is now the largest religion in the world.

The winged ox represents St. Luke. Oxen were used in temple sacrifices. St. Luke's gospel includes the parable of the Prodigal Son, in which the fatted calf is slaughtered, not only to celebrate the

younger son's return, but also to foreshadow the joy we must have in receiving reconciliation through our Savior who, as Priest offered Himself in sacrifice to forgive our sins.

Therefore, the winged ox reminds us of the priestly character of our Lord and His sacrifice for our redemption.

When the pandemic struck, Fareeha

believes God guided her to continue her education and along with support from her husband and a special Aunt, she gained admission to "Intra Oral Dental (level 1 & 2)". This was a healthcare professional course that takes from fifteen to eighteen months to complete.

Trying to study (much of it online) plus caring for her family certainly produced stress and fatigue. But light was at the end of the tunnel, as she completed all her clinical work and theory, plus a placement in an established dental

office. This month Fareeha graduates as a Dental Assistant. She hopes to gain Employment. as she is eager to use her new skills to assist with dental procedures, educating patients in oral hygiene and other chairside tasks.

National Seniors Day

National Seniors Day in Canada is celebrated on October 1, in keeping with the United Nations declaration made in 1990 as International Day of Older Persons. It was first observed on October 1, 1991, and is recognized by all UN member states. Its purpose is to raise awareness of issues facing older people and to foster respect for them as the guardians of family history and traditions.

DIFFERENT THEMES

There is a different theme each year. In 2019, it was about recognizing the achievements of older people in society. In 2020, the theme had to do with pandemics and how they might affect how age and ageing are addressed, as the elderly were hardest-hit by the COVID-19 pandemic. It revealed a desperate need for better living conditions in elder care facilities.

DIGITAL EQUITY

The theme for 2021 is "Digital Equity for All Ages", emphasizing the need for access and participation in the digital world by older persons. In some cases, there is lack of access, and in others some difficulty in keeping up with rapid changes in technology in ways that could be beneficial to them.

The pandemic has left many isolated, with reduced opportunities to meet with others in person or to access goods and services and being left behind in the rapid advances in technology and communication makes it even more difficult.

Our older generation includes grandparents, parents and siblings who have guided and protected younger family members and worked hard to achieve our current quality of life.

SHOWING APPRECIATION

Some suggested ways to show appreciation for all their contributions to family and community life are by visiting older relatives or friends, inviting them on an outing, perhaps surprising them with a gift or engaging them in a culinary activity using one of their family favourite recipes. Continuing with regular contact and



conversation can help them to feel included. In keeping with this year's "digital equity" theme, if older relatives are curious about digital communication, bringing an I-Pad or tablet when visiting them could provide an enjoyable way to demonstrate how it could enhance their quality of life.

for eager buyers. Knitters, crafters and jewellery makers, it's time to put your skills to work too.


Another date to remember - the Primate, the Most Rev. Linda Nicholls has graciously agreed to
